New Councillor

A warm Welcome to Mrs Gillian Houston who has been co-opted to the Parish Council.

Mrs Houston has also accepted to be the Council's **Broadband Champion**. She is one of 24 Parish Champions in the Carlisle District.

Gillian will help to raise awareness of the benefits for superfast broadband, organise local events, meet clubs and groups, talk with local business and encourage as many as possible to take up the offer of the faster broadband service.

Broadband UK (BDUK) has recently announced that it is making £17.1m available to Cumbria and it is hoped that more money can be granted from European funds to help improve rural broadband services. The Parish Council's May meeting saw a good attendance from those in the parish anxious to see increased broadband speeds to sustain business and education. As a result we have been able to focus on several issues and hope to see progress in the near future.



Highways.

At its last meeting the Parish Council heard from residents living near Hethersgill cross roads about their concerns for road safety. County Councillor John Mallinson who attended the meeting, undertook to address the issues and we have been told the road markings and signs near the crossroads will be "refreshed". The Community police have also been involved in looking at speed limits in the area. It is not likely that there be any change to current limits however. Thanks to John for his help.

Agreed Route Maps for transporting timber - The County Council has decided on an "Agreed Route plan for Timber Iorries" The County Council has sought to reassure the Parish Council that there will be no increase in traffic on the C1005. Let's wait and see!

A BT Funding opportunity for Community groups

WINDFARMS in CUMBRIA

Reference A: Your GC/GC/009440/11 of 13" March 2011. Reference B: My ETM/KCS of 13" March 2011

Thank you for your response at Reference A and I note your comments. I write in response on behalf of the Cumbria Leaders' Board of which I am the Chairman.

I believe no-one could deny the imperative to seek alternative methods of energy production and, particularly, the increased and increasing use of renewable energy sources in order to reduce carbon emissions and secure a greener future. In that regard, my colleagues (of all political persuasions at Cumbria's county council) endorse your sentiments and support your ambitions.

Where we would take leave to fundamentally disagree with government policy (and notwithstanding whatsoever might firmally emerge in the Localism Bill) is in the imposition of wind farms on communities despite the overwhelming, objective and well-argued opposition. It becomes increasingly difficult to defend government's renewable-energy policies regarding wind farms given:

- The relative and perceived impotence of local communities, including the local planning authorities (LPA) which ends up paying £60,000 for an invariably fulle public inquiry.
- The bizarre, if not absurd/obscene, tax-payer subsidy paid to wind farm developers, yet
 the government is not prepared to subsidise nuclear power stations. A two or three
 reactor station at Selfafield would dispense with the need for more wind farms in
 Cumbria. So, too, would the development and subsidising of hydro-power in Cumbria.
- Payments to wind farm developers even when the turbines are not producing electricity.
 Each household is subsidising wind farms to the tune of £32 per year. The electorate did not give the government a mandate to impose this charge.
- · The relative inefficiency and unreliability of wind farms.

- Successive governments have completely ignored the all-party Cumbria County Council resolution;
 - The County Council calls on the Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change to give a commitment to seek to ensure that Government will reduce its over reliance on onshore wind, reduce current wind-related targets and invest, as a matter of urgency, in other low curbon energy generation.
- In terms of existing and forecast windfarm development in Cumbria we already have 90 operational commercial wind energy schemes with 3 more consented, 6.5 under construction, 40 awaiting construction and a further 46 or more where applications have been submitted. This does not include small scale schemes, offshore schemes or other forms of sustainable energy generation.

I would not wish, of course, to question the expertise, integrity or professionalism of the planning inspectorate but it remains difficult, nonetheless, to convince local communities and, indeed, local politicians that public inquiries of wind farm applications are no more than cosmetic exercises, that the government (of any persuasion) is obsessed with EU imposed targets, and that the concept of local democracy appears to be quite meaningless. In short, and despite the palliative rhetoric and occasional panaceas, central government is simply not listening. And that is profoundly depressing. And fundamentally undemocratic.

Finally, if I may turn to the financial concessions and the return of the business rate which you mention in your letter, the relationship between the community grants currently afforded by wind farm developers bear little relationship to the vast net profits realised over the 25 year period.

RES Ltd - about to develop a six turbine wind farm (after a public inquiry) at Taliantine in West Cumbria - is offering the community £25,000 per year to be agreed and distributed between several communities/parishes. Frankly, this is a pitful amount which simply adds further to the sense of profound grievance which communities feet. No amount of community compensation will ever attenuate the strength of feeling against wind farms but it is offensive, if not impertinent, to believe that such a derisory sum could moderate community antipathy.

It follows, therefore, that adequate and agreed compensation to local communities should be a pre-requisite planning condition to be arbitrated and imposed by the local planning authority. I would urge you to consider this possibility whilst the Localism Bill is making its passage through Parliament, in addition to the return of the local business rates to the local communities. I might further enquire which local communities are you referring to: parish councils, District Councils, or even the county council.
